Mission: NomoGaia is a nonprofit research and policy organization dedicated to clarifying the role of business in the advancement of human rights, fostering greater human rights awareness among corporations, and securing greater protection of rights for people who are touched by increasingly globalized industries.

Our thanks

Gratitude: Covid-19 shed a searing light on problems that predated this crisis. We didn't travel, meet rightsholders or take photographs, but we still witnessed, through friends and colleagues, the ravages of the pandemic compounding already urgent challenges. Thanks to your support, we also helped to shape some major successes.

Lockdown offered us opportunities we wouldn't otherwise have had: to take looong phone calls to problem-solve tough questions about supply chains; to build databases of unattended information that revealed gross injustices towards marginalized peoples and pointed to ways that small changes could have major ripple effects. Unable to travel, we hired researchers from Indonesia to Colombia to conduct interviews on our behalf.

Empowered by you, we remained laser focused on changing systems and structures of oppression to reduce or reverse the harms they cause. Thank you for your support and your confidence in these trying times.


Impact and Results

NomoGaia doesn't "help" people. Our work is about systems and structures, stopping industry actors and investors from causing, contributing to, or profiting from abuses.

- Bringing human rights expertise to the <u>Bonsucro Sugar Certification</u> <u>Standards</u> revision process, we are making sugar producers worldwide accountable for slave wages, police brutality and chronic kidney disease in their value chains.
- Strengthening the <u>Aluminium Stewardship Initiative Certification</u> <u>Standards</u>, we are cutting human rights abuses out of the value chain of cans, cars, computers and oxygen canisters. ASI's standards, once implemented in 2022, will affect the value chains of 102 operations in 39 countries.
- We cataloged and reviewed <u>over 2000 investment documents</u> by the World Bank's private lending arm, IFC, on its impacts on indigenous communities. The data showed major inconsistencies. IFC is "missing" indigenous communities that need protection. We made 9 recommendations to improve outcomes. IFC accepted 7. We'll work on the last two in 2021!
- With 3 new global researchers based in Indonesia, Colombia and South Carolina, we have reviewed nearly 800 complaints (and counting) from eight separate mechanisms, documenting the rightsolders' point of view. (Publications forthcoming!)

What's next

- The future is always uncertain but never moreso than now, for a nonprofit research group focused on ground-truthing solutions to global human rights problems.
- One part of the world where groundtruthing has been impossible but corporate human rights scrutiny is necessary is the Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region of China, where a genocide is unfolding. We have identified World Bank investments in the region and will invest substantial resources to better understanding global complicity in these violations, and developing solutions in 2021
- We will also expand our work evaluating corporate "remedies" for human rights abuses, with plans to expand our research network into South Asia to evaluate additional human rights claims in the region. By working with local researchers we can build local capacity, prevent the spread of Covid, and continue finding structural solutions to systemic abuses.
